

Dear Parish Family,

Worldly ambition drives us to try to appear more important than we are. In this Sunday's Gospel, the disciples have strange ideas about the Kingdom of God. They have certainly not understood the implications of being disciples of Jesus. The continued misunderstanding of the disciples and their preoccupation with worldly honors, not unlike many of us, requires Jesus to command that they must become servants of all – as he was. In the face of such failure to understand what he is speaking about, Jesus sets a child in front of them, and invites them to understand what he is talking about.

Unlike adults, the child's struggle is not for first place but for life. In order to live the child accepts the necessity of receiving everything from its parents. The fundamental attitude of the child is one of *trust* in its parents and of *humility*. The affection with which Jesus embraced the child was meant to teach them a lesson. Jesus teaches them that the first shall be last, and that their attitude to each other should be like the way they treat a child – as someone to be helped and cared for. Nor should this be seen as a passing act of kindness, but as a constant awareness of other's needs and a desire to fulfil those needs "in the name of Jesus."

In the struggle for position and rank in many societies and even in our Christian communities, we can easily forget that the thing that counts most is to recognize that we are all children of the same Father, and that we must trust in him. Jesus offers a permanent challenge to his followers to welcome the powerless, and to take to heart the weakest members of our communities. He places himself in their company. Their vulnerability is something that Jesus not only shares, but values. May we always follow in his footsteps of service as good stewards of time, talent and treasure.

Know your Catholic Faith Corner



Apologetics Without Apology *Year of Reading the Bible*

Wisdom 2:12, 17-20; James 3:16—4:3; Mark 9:30-37

Scriptural Background:

This Sunday's Gospel takes place shortly after Jesus' Transfiguration on Mt. Tabor (Mark 9:2-8), his disclosing to them a mystery about John the Baptist (Mark 9:11-13; see also Malachi 3:23-24; Matthew 17:10-13), and Jesus' casting out of a demon from a young boy (Mark 9:14-29). This episode marks the end of his ministry in Galilee. From this point in Mark's Gospel, he will be more intent on making his final journey to Jerusalem and to his death. Jesus uses this time for more personal instruction to his disciples to prepare and strengthen them for the coming events that will shake their faith, as he began to tell them in last week's reading from Mark 8:31-37. The disciples seem to be in a state of denial: even while they hear his words, they are afraid to ask him the hard questions (verse 32). Instead, the disciples are focusing, not on his instruction to them in this critical time, but on the petty details of their own agendas about who is the greatest (verse 34). Jesus takes the opportunity to show them the greatest of them will be the one who: puts himself last; is the servant of all and; will receive the seemingly most insignificant person with great love. Such persons should even be regarded as an emissary from God (verse 37)!

Questions for reflection:

- ◇ Read all of Wisdom, chapter 2, from which our First Reading is taken. How is this a clear prophecy of the events surrounding the events of Our Lord's life?
- ◇ How do the attitudes of the people in that reading and in the Gospel Reading reflect those of some today?

receives not me but the One who sent me.”




Stewardship of Treasure


School News

What is Priesthood Sunday?

Priesthood Sunday is a special day set aside to honor priesthood in the United States. It is a day to reflect upon and affirm the role of the priesthood in the life of the Church as a central one. This nationwide event is coordinated and sponsored by the US Council of Serra International.

When is Priesthood Sunday celebrated?

Priesthood Sunday is celebrated on the last Sunday of September (September 26, 2021).

Why is Priesthood Sunday important?

Catholics are invited to observe Vatican-backed worldwide events, namely, [World Day of Prayer for Vocations](#) and [World Day for Consecrated Life](#). In the United States, we also have [National Vocation Awareness Week](#) and [National Catholic Sisters Week](#). **Priesthood Sunday, however, specifically honors priests, without whom the Mass could not be offered and Sacraments could not be celebrated.**

More than the other events listed above, Priesthood Sunday is a more personal one for parishes and organizations with a chaplain. It is for those who cultivate close working relationships with their priests and therefore could benefit from a special day to express their gratitude. It's a chance to thank and honor priests in unique ways.

It is essential to note that **the number of priests and ordinations in the United States has steadily declined in the past 50 years.** Meanwhile, the number of parishes without a resident priest pastor has sharply increased in the same period of time. ([See the official statistics from the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate \(CARA\) here.](#)) **The men who answer the call to priesthood are special indeed, and they are working harder than ever before.**

As I look back on the last 25 years of Faith Action for Community Equity’s existence, I can certainly say that we have gone through our powerful and not-so-powerful periods. Such is the ebb and flow nature of grassroots organizations like ours.

But one thing that always grounds an “organization of organizations” like Faith Action is our roots, our history. Whenever we struggle to find purpose or meaning in the work we are doing as people of faith fighting for social justice, we need only look to our beginnings--our formation and development, our first issue, our first leaders, our first action, our first victory! There are jewels in that.

I distinctly recall our Founding Convention in October of 1998 when we gathered 1,000 people at Farrington High School auditorium. It was a culmination of the countless one-on-one conversations and hard work of the previous two years, including organizing the residents of Kalihi Valley Homes.

I got chicken skin from the energy I could feel down to my bones! We got then gubernatorial candidates Ben Cayetano and Linda Lingle to commit to renovations of KVH and it was then that we knew we really held *power*.

As we continue in our life together, let us take time to reflect at every crossroad and incorporate the wisdom gained from our experiences. May we keep moving forward by building and cultivating our relationships, calling each other and our leaders into accountability, and making OUR community what we want!



“PLEDGING to work tirelessly for ‘the voiceless and the outcast,’ 1,000 members of Oahu churches gathered in Kalihi yesterday to christen a multi-faith group, Faith Action for Community Equity (FACE), and seek commitments from the candidates for governor,” reported The Honolulu Advertiser on Nov.1, 1998. This was the Founding Convention of FACE held Oct. 31, 1998. Gov.
