Dear Parish Family,

The readings this Sunday call us to be inclusive. Realizing that they were closely associated with Jesus and were in quite a privileged position with healing powers, the disciples were not happy when they saw a man who was not a disciple cast out evil spirits. They were obviously quite jealous and indignant. They even tried to stop the man from doing a good thing. But Jesus tells them: "You must not stop him: ... Anyone who is not against us is for us." It is very easy for a chosen group to become elitist, to claim for itself a monopoly of doing good.

Yes, we Christians believe that the Church is God's special way of revealing himself to the world. But we really cannot go on to claim that therefore God, His truth and goodness is only to be found in the Church; that only among our ranks can people be "saved".

The truth is that God is doing his work through all kinds of people. In any government and society there are many good, dedicated and patently honest people who really serve the public. During the many catastrophes, natural and man-made, that have struck our world, we find people of faiths and no faith coming together. Surely God is present and working through such people. Christians clearly have no monopoly on loving others. And we can add that wherever there is true justice being practised, there is God; wherever there is true freedom being promoted or defended, there is God; wherever there is a person, perhaps a total stranger from another race or culture, who acts as a true brother or sister to any of us, there is God, and so on... We are all called to be truly embracing that which is truly good and become a brother or sister to one another in God's love.

In Christ, *Fr. Peter* Saint John Vianney Parish, a Christian Community in the Roman Catholic tradition, motivated by the love of God, provides opportunities in worship, education, ministry and outreach for its parishioners and the community at large.

Apologetics Without Apology Year of Reading the Bible

Numbers 11:25-29; James 5:1-6; Mark 9:38-43, 45, 47-48

Scriptural Background: This Sunday's Gospel is a continuation of last week's reading (Mark 9:30-37). The disciples, rebuked by Jesus in their attempt to claim for themselves a prominent place in his Kingdom, resort to attacking a man who, while not of their own circle, is performing exorcisms in Jesus' name. Due to their own recently failed attempt at this type of healing (Mark 9:14-29), they may have felt a little insecure! Jesus urges tolerance for those who are not opposing him and, in a certain way, honor his name by acknowledging its power. He goes on to relate this to how all of his disciples (the "little ones") should be treated. He makes it abundantly clear that this is a serious matter with either 41)—or (verse dire consequences. Gehenna, or Valley of Hinnom, (to which Jesus refers in verses 43-45) was a small ravine outside of Jerusalem where during Israel's early history, child sacrifice had been offered to pagan gods. even by one of Israel's particularly evil kings, Ahaz (2 Chronicles 28:1-3). In Jesus time, as an unclean place, it was a dump where rubbish burned night and day, and had become proverbial as a metaphor for eternal punishment (Jeremiah 7:30-33).

Questions for Reflection:

- Looking at the Second Reading: how have you used your personal resources—such as money, influence, talent, or time—for the benefit of others? How might you seek God's wisdom to learn how you should use your resources?
- What does Jesus' application of the image of Gehenna tell you about the seriousness of how he regards the sin of scandal?

The LORD came down in the cloud and spoke to Moses.

Taking some of the spirit that was on Moses, the LORD bestowed it on the seventy elders; and as the spirit came to rest on them, they prophesied. Now two men, one named Eldad and the other Medad, were not in the gathering but had been left in the camp.

Reading II James 5:1-6

Come now, you rich, weep and wail over your impending miseries.

Your wealth has rotted away, your clothes have become moth-eaten,

your gold and silver have corroded,

and that corrosion will be a testimony against you; it will devour your flesh like a fire.

You have stored up treasure for the last days.

Behold, the wages you withheld from the workers who harvested your fields are crying aloud;

and the cries of the harvesters

have reached the ears of the Lord of hosts.

You have lived on earth in luxury and pleasure;

you have fattened your hearts for the day of slaughter.

You have condemned;

you have murdered the righteous one;

he offers you no resistance. You ask but do not receive, because you ask wrongly, to spend it on your passions.

Gospel Mark 9:38-43, 45, 47-48

At that time, John said to Jesus,

"Teacher, we saw someone driving out demons in your name,

and we tried to prevent him because he does not follow us."

Jesus replied, "Do not prevent him.

There is no one who performs a mighty deed in my name

who can at the same time speak ill of me.

For whoever is not against us is for us. Anyone who gives you a cup of water to drink

because you belong to Christ, amen, I say to you, will surely not lose his reward.

"Whoever causes one of these little ones who believe in me to sin, it would be better for him if a great millstone

were put around his neck and he were thrown into the sea. If your hand causes you to sin, cut it off.

It is better for you to enter into life maimed

than with two hands to go into Gehenna,

into the unquenchable fire.

And if your foot causes you to sin, cut if off.

It is better for you to enter into life crippled

than with two feet to be thrown into Gehenna.

And if your eye causes you to sin, pluck it out.

Better for you to enter into the kingdom of God with one eye

than with two eyes to be thrown into Gehenna,

where 'their worm does not die, and the fire is not quenched.'"


Offertory: Our weekly donations for September 4-10 was \$9364 and 11-17, 2021 was \$5609 and


School News by Earl Walker

EUCHARISTIC ADORATION INTRODUCTION

What is Eucharistic Adoration?

It is a special time of prayer before the Eucharistic presence of Jesus. Jesus, in the form of the Consecrated Host, is placed inside the Monstrance in a clear window for us to see. Adoration is showing that we know God is truly God, our Savior, and the creator of everything that exists.



Is Jesus really present in the Blessed Sacrament?

Yes! Absolutely! The Consecrated Host is the real Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of Jesus, His true Presence, in the form of bread. Jesus did not say the Eucharist would be a symbol, He didn't say that it represents Him, He says the Eucharist IS Him! What an awesome gift we have been given, to be able to come before the very presence of our Lord Jesus. He is very real and He is here!

During the Adoration

The readings, songs and prayers recited during the Adoration are meant to direct attention to worship of Christ in the Eucharist. A prayerful spirit is encouraged by periods of silence and brief exhortations aimed at developing a better understanding of the mystery of the Eucharist. During this quiet time, we think, reflect, feel, or listen to Jesus. In adoration, we are before the very powerful and mighty Jesus who humbly appears before us in the form of the host.

Behavior Expectations

First and foremost: Reverence -- reverence for our King! Because Jesus will truly be present, we need to be sure to show Jesus proper respect and reverence because He is our King. We show Jesus respect and honor with our good behavior and our good posture when we sit and kneel. Be as quiet and still as possible before our Lord which includes avoiding talk -- even whispers.

Benediction

After a period of both silent reflections combined with meditative readings, Adoration concludes with the Benediction, when a priest or deacon blesses the people with the Eucharist. The celebrant puts on a humeral veil which is used to lift the monstrance for the blessing. Afterwards, the Eucharist is taken to the Church's tabernacle while a song is traditionally sung.

Our Adoration service typically lasts an hour. In fact, many Catholics refer to Adoration as The Holy Hour. While we hope you will stay for the entire service, it is perfectly acceptable to spend just a few minutes in Adoration.

The continuing rise of COVID-19 cases and its heart-breaking effects led to two Faith Action town hall meetings in September. There, members expressed their heartfelt concerns about the pandemic and shared ideas on how people of faith will be heard by the Governor. The result is a letter to the Governor. A Letter to Governor Ige From Faith Action: "Translating Belief of Love into Action"

Dear Governor Ige,

As faith communities in Hawai'i, we recognize the pain — physical, emotional, economic, and spiritual — being felt by many as a result of Covid19.

We know there are no easy answers. We know the foundation of all our religious beliefs is love — love for our Creator and for our neighbors as ourselves. Thus we feel compelled to take personal action and encourage additional action from you.

Translating belief into action, we pledge to become more vocal and more visible, and to take some or all of the following measures in the weeks and months ahead:

- Support mandatory vaccination as we preach from our pulpits the importance of showing love for our neighbors by getting vaccinated. We deny religious exemptions.
- Maintain all safety protocols, even though churches are exempt from some limits.
- Encourage sharing of stories among our members, to address fears or misconceptions about vaccination.
- When possible, open our church facilities as sites for vaccinations.
- Promote health literacy to help ourselves understand the facts of viruses
- Support expanded or complete shutdown of the state, when needed to save lives.

We also encourage you, as Governor, to take additional actions for the good of the state.


- Work with the State Board of Education to improve the safety of schools for our keiki
- Reduce barriers to Covid testing
- Step up special efforts with those populations where mortality rates are high (Filipinos, Native Hawaiians, Pacific Islanders; empower their leaders to share accurate health information
- Send the message repeatedly that exemption from vaccination does not exempt you from the consequences of being unvaccinated (i.e., you cannot access any setting where vaccination is required)
- Impose a complete shutdown, if Covid numbers continue to rise to dangerous levels.
