Dear Parish Family,

This week we return to the liturgical season of Ordinary Time. This long season ahead of us extends until November 29, the First Sunday of Advent. This Sunday and next, however, are designated as solemnities, special days that call our attention to central mysteries of our faith.

We kick off this season with a feast that is so central to our faith, *the Trinity*. This feast reminds us that we believe in a triune God, who is a *mystery*: the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. Although the name 'Trinity' is nowhere mentioned in the scriptures, we know that Jesus commands us to: "Baptize them in the name of the Father the Son and the Holy Spirit" (Mt 28, 19). The doctrine and theology of the Trinity is one that has raised lots of debates and controversies in the history of the church. We cannot adequately explain who God is, but one of the keys to help us understand the Trinity a little better is the concept of relationships. In the Trinity, there are three persons who are in such intense relationship with one another that, although they are distinct persons, they are so perfectly united in every way, that they are *one*. Nothing separates them, except that they are not the same person, and there is mutual understanding and respect that exists.

The Gospel reading reminds us that God the Father, out of love for the world, sent his Son into the world in order to save it. Through the death and resurrection of the Son, we have been given the gift of the Holy Spirit. And as we celebrate the solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, we must pause to reflect on how the Trinity offers us a model for living. Just as the three persons of the Trinity are united as one, as stewards of God's love in service, we must strive to live in ever-greater unity with God and one another. This calls for more collaboration with respect in our uniqueness in ministry while maintaining our individuality.

### **Know Your Catholic Faith Corner** Apologetics without apology! Our Belief in Purgatory

The term Purgatory comes from a Latin word purgare, meaning to make clean or to purify in accordance with Catholic teaching. It is a place or condition of temporal punishment for those who, departing this life in God's grace, are not entirely free from venial faults, or have not fully paid the satisfaction due to their transgressions.

Fundamentalists charge that, "The word purgatory is nowhere found in Scripture." This is true and it brings us right back to what we talked about in the month of April, Tradition. John 21:25 reminds us that not everything was written down in the Bible. As such, it does not disprove the existence of purgatory or the fact that belief in it has always been part of Church teaching. The words *Trinity* and *Incarnation* aren't in Scripture either, yet those doctrines are clearly taught in it. Likewise, Scripture teaches that purgatory exists, even if it doesn't use that word and even if 1 Peter 3:19 refers to a place other than purgatory.


The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* defines purgatory as a "purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven," which is experienced by those "who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified" (CCC 1030). It notes that "this final purification of the elect . . . is entirely different from the punishment of the damned" (CCC 1031).

Purification is necessary because, as Scripture teaches, nothing unclean will enter the presence of God in heaven (Rev. 21:27) and, while we may die with our mortal sins forgiven, there can still be many impurities in us, specifically venial sins. Every soul needs to be cleansed or "purged" of its remaining imperfections in order to attain sanctification and purgatory is the final stage of sanctification that some of us need to undergo before we enter heaven. (Rom. 5:3–5)



#### 13th ANNIVERSARY OF ORDINATION - 06/08/20



### **Our Belief in Purgatory**

Scripture teaches that purgatory exists, even if it doesn't use the word specifically.

We believe that the souls of the saved who are in need of further purification before facing God will be purged in purgatory. (see back side).

## APOLOGETICS DEFENDING THE FAITH Our Belief in Purgatory

- The Church has given the name Purgatory to the place where final purification of the elect will take place, which is entirely different from the punishment of the damned.
- Although a person dies in a state of grace, they may need purification because they died with sins that they failed to confess or failed to pay penance for before death.
- Purgatory is the place of purification, "to achieve the holiness
  necessary to enter the joy of heaven," because, as Scripture teaches, nothing unclean
  will enter the presence of God in heaven (Rev. 21:27)
- Temporary punishments are suffered by some in this life only, by others after death, by others both now and then; but all of them before that last and strictest judgment.
- When we die we undergo individual judgment, but at the end of time, when Jesus returns, there will come the final judgment. (Matthew 25:31-32)
- From the earliest of times, the Fathers of the Church taught the existence of purgatory, as well as by the Jews at the time of the Maccabees.
- Some of the earliest Christian writings during the second century refer to the practice
  of praying for the dead.
- Prayers for the dead are also recorded in the catacombs, where Christians were persecuted during the first three centuries.
- The Church has only two official teachings concerning purgatory: it exists, and our prayers help the souls in purgatory.
- The Reformers rejected the doctrine that had always been believed by both Jews and Early Christians and is still believed by Orthodox Jews today.
- The Eastern Orthodox Church, Oriental Orthodox Churches, and elements of the Anglican, Lutheran and Methodist traditions hold that for some there is cleansing after death and pray for the dead.
