

Dear Parish Family,

We are often advised to take care of our heart, to watch our diet, to exercise, to undergo cardiovascular screening, but there is another kind of heart that should concern us, our spiritual heart. Jesus spoke often about our spiritual heart. The following of Jesus should begin in our hearts but if our spiritual heart is unwell, it hinders our response to **Jesus**. So Jesus says in this Sunday's Gospel:

"Gross is the heart of this people, they will hardly hear with their ears, they have closed their eyes..." (Mat 13:15)

What is the state of our heart? Is your heart open to receiving the words of Jesus or is your heart a source of grief to Jesus? Related to the parable of the Sower that Jesus tells us, we like to think of ourselves as good people. In that sense we are the fertile soil that received the seed and produced much fruit. But since none of us is yet a saint, we each have areas in our heart that are in need of "spiritual" cardiac surgery. There are four types of soil: shallow, rocky, thorny, and rich. There is some of each of these four types in each of us. We could be all four of these persons at once, or predominantly, one of these types of person for a certain time in life. Let us do some cardiac surgery on our spiritual hearts.

And may God the Father enlighten the eyes of our mind so that we can see what hope his call holds for us, what rich glories he has promised that the saints will inherit, so that we may receive the Word of God in rich soil and yield a harvest, now a hundredfold, now sixty, now thirty; love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, trustfulness, gentleness and self-control. And for the young receiving the Sacraments this weekend, may they be blessed and become fruitful on their journey of faith.

## Apologetics without apology! What is an Indulgence?

Last Sunday we saw that an indulgence is defined as "the remission of the temporal punishment due, in God's justice, to sin that has been forgiven, which remission is granted by the Church." Part of the collateral damage of the long ago Protestant revolt is that many Catholics have largely forgotten about indulgences. Indulgences are good and just, and they are part of the Church's infallible teaching. The bad press they've received is due to misunderstandings or to abuses.

Indulgences aren't a "money grab" by villainous medieval bishops; and they aren't a get-out-of-hell free card. What they are is the way the Church can exempt a member of the faithful from the temporal punishment due to their sins, after that person has already been forgiven of the eternal consequences of sin through confession. and the sacrifice of Jesus Christ. Here is an illustration:

Say Johnny's playing baseball in the living room and breaks a vase. He might muster his courage and confess, and he might have true sorrow and contrition, and you might forgive him. You're not going to kick him out of the house (eternal consequence). But that doesn't un-break the vase. The broken vase is the temporal consequence of vase-breaking. It must be replaced. The Bible teaches us that there are always both eternal and temporal consequences of sin.

So you might set up a payment plan for Johnny, and allow him to do extra chores and earn money to put away towards buying a replacement vase, as the temporal consequence. But then, maybe all the other kids in the neighborhood pool their savings and go in together to buy a new vase. Indulgences are like that. Our prayers and sacrifices and good works all go in together with the prayers and sacrifices and good works of Christ and the saints who have gone before us and can be applied, by the Church, where the Church chooses.

The perfect pandemic storm has finally arrived: Hospitals are opening back but our donation levels are still critically low.


We need all blood types! Blood Bank of Hawaii has less than one day supply of our blood inventories.



# **ACTION ALERT**

Elections in 2020 are going to be very different! Gone are the days when you go to ballot booth. Now, whether or not you like it, the ballot comes to you. To find out how that is going to work, you can watch the video (at right) produced by the Office of Elections.

In order to ensure that as many people vote as possible, we wanted to provide you with a few reminders. First and foremost, (1) make sure that you are registered to vote. You should have received a few mailings already from the Office of Elections including a signature capture card. (2) Hopefully you received, and returned, that signature capture card. (We can talk about security and safety at another time, but know that we



have our concerns.) If you did NOT receive anything in the mail, please <u>contact the</u> <u>Office of Elections directly</u>.

Our website for <u>voting information (ivote)</u> has been updated with key dates and resources so check it out if you want to ensure you are ready to receive the ballet packet on our around July 21.

What about the Hawaii Family Forum voter's guide? Hawaii Family Forum normally produces a voter's guide, but we will not be doing one until the General Election. Lack of funding and staffing have made it difficult to provide a guide that will be beneficial to you. As some of you have pointed out, many candidates don't even bother to return our survey. So, as we have done in the last two elections, we will be providing contact information FOR THE GENERAL ELECTION on the candidates so you can make contact with them directly. If all goes well, we WILL have a guide ready for the general election.

Your ballot package should begin to arrive on or around July 21. Want to see what your primary ballot will look like? Click here.

July 27 - August 7, 2020 Voter Service Centers will be open Monday-Saturday (not open on Sundays) from 8:00 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. Voter service centers provide accessible in-person voting, same day voter registration, and collection of voted ballots. Voter service centers open ten business days prior to the election and on Election Day

August 8, 2020 PRIMARY ELECTION DAY the Voter Service Center will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.


