Dear Parish family,

"Ask anything of me," God says to Solomon today, "and I will give it to you." God gives Solomon an incredible gift, the freedom to have exactly what he asks for. And with that freedom, Solomon asks for something that pleases God: He asks for an understanding heart. Solomon, who knows the ways of God and is faithful to him, is already wise in his own ways. Yet rather than increase his own stature, he seeks to honor God as the source of that wisdom. He gives glory to God by acknowledging his reliance upon him.

A similar expression is exhibited by the individuals in the Gospel parables. Here, the freedom is found in the desire to experience the Kingdom of heaven. There is a sort of irony present, though. In a certain sense, the person who digs for treasure already owned the treasure underneath his feet. Likewise, the merchant who buys the pearl of great price already had the wealth with which to purchase it. Christ's parables are clearly not about making good business deals. Jesus' teaching is as much an encounter as it is a goal.

Both of these parables teach us that as Christians we seek to desire the Kingdom of heaven because we already know it and are partially in it. For we who love God, all things, every day, work together for the good, as Saint Paul says. (Romans 8:28) Each moment of our work and leisure, our joys and even our sorrows, every moment is its own reward when we operate with the understanding of the nearness of the Kingdom. And that Kingdom is only found in Jesus Christ, who is the way, and we seek more of it by following him.

# Know your Catholic Faith Corner

# Apologetics Without Apology! Kinds of Indulgences

As we conclude this series, we review the definition of an indulgence as: "the remission of the temporal punishment due to sin that has already been forgiven in Confession." The first thing to note is that forgiveness of a sin is separate from punishment for the sin.

From the merely human standpoint, we think of punishment as "settling scores." We punish wrongdoers by restricting their freedom, requiring some unpleasant work, or even causing pain. Such punishments are motivated primarily by the desire to restore justice or to avenge misdeeds and deter oneself from other crimes. By contrast, God's punishments always emerge from his merciful love. As such, God's penalties act as "medicine" to heal the self-inflicted wounds caused by personal sins, specifically the destruction of our friendship with God. The punishment somehow corrects the sinner's disastrous turning away from Him. Here is an example for our understanding:

Imagine, say, a high school freshman who wants to become an engineer. He definitely needs to learn calculus. While in ninth grade he takes advanced algebra, plays video games during class, never pays attention, and fails the course. If he wants to learn calculus and have any hope of becoming an engineer, he must retake algebra during summer. In one sense, summer school is a painful punishment for playing video games in class. But it also eventually "heals" the student's mind, which had become wounded by self-imposed ignorance of algebra.


At first glance, summer school appears to be a cruel punishment; but it's really an act of mercy because it restores to the student the possibility of reaching the goal of an engineering degree. Divine punishment does the same thing: it heals and returns the sinner to heaven's road.



ST. JOHN VIANNEY
Learn more about our Patron Saint

St. John Mary Vianney was ordained a priest in 1815. Three years later he was made the parish priest of Ars, a remote French hamlet, not very far from the town of Lyons. Within a short time, his reputation as a confessor and director of souls became well known. People began coming to him from other parishes, then from nearby villages, then from all parts of France, and finally from other countries.

The most distinguished persons visited the village of Ars for the purpose of seeing the holy curé and hearing his daily instruction. His instructions were simple in language, full of imagery drawn from daily life and country scenes. His direction was characterized by common sense, remarkable insight and supernatural knowledge. It is recorded that even the staunchest of sinners were converted at his mere word. His advice was sought by bishops, priests, religious, young men and women in doubt as to their vocation, sinners, persons in all sorts of difficulties and the sick. By 1855, the number of pilgrims visiting Ars to see Vianney is estimated to have reached twenty thousand a year.


During the last ten years of his life, he spent from sixteen to eighteen hours a day in the confessional. His life was filled with works of charity and love. Although he was a wonderworker loved by the crowds, he retained a childlike simplicity throughout his life. He labored incessantly, with unfailing humility, gentleness, patience and cheerfulness until he was more than seventy-three years old.

He died August 4, 1859 and on October 3, 1874 Pope Pius IX proclaimed him Venerable; on January 8, 1905, Pope Pius X declared him Blessed and proposed him as a model to the parochial clergy; in 1925 Pope Pius XI canonized him. In 1929 he was made patron saint of all parish priests.

# Celebrating the Feast Day of St John Vianney

What is a Novena? It is a series of prayers that are said for 9 straight days, usually as a prayer of petition but sometimes as a prayer of thanksgiving. Novenas have their roots in the 9 days that the Apostles spent in prayer between Ascension and Pentecost Sunday (Lk 24: 49).





On Tuesday, August 4, 2020 we will celebrate the Feast day of St. John Vianney. Did you know that as a Parish, we have been in existence for 58 years? It is not by coincidence that we continue to thrive. It certainly is by grace, the presence of the Lord among us. To obtain this grace, St. John Vianney continually intercedes for us as well.

All parishioners are invited to invoke his intercessions as we approach his Feast Day. Beginning on Sunday, July 26 until Monday, August 3, during all Masses, we will recite the daily Novena Prayer as we prepare as individuals, families and the parish community. For those that cannot attend Sunday or weekday Masses, you are encouraged to pray the Novena from your home.

Therefore, whoever takes the lowly position of this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. (Pause for reflection)

# Responsory:

L. Teach us to be humble, and to see with a child's heart the great deeds of God around us.

R. And give us the grace to imitate the humility of St. John Vianney.

(Together all say:) Our Father..... | Hail Mary,..... | Glory be..... (leader: In the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit) All: Amen. I (Conclude with the hymn to St. John Vianney at the end of this booklet)

DAY TWO (July 27, Monday) (Start with the Opening Prayer to Saint John Vianney)

**Scripture reflection:** 1 John 1:9 (reader:) If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness. (Pause for reflection)

# Responsory:

- L. Help us to celebrate confession and the sacrament of penance frequently, so as to become closer to Christ's image.
- R. And never fail to trust in the grace of that sacrament so pastorally shared by St. John Vianney's patience in the confessional.

**DAY THREE (July 28, Tuesday)** (Start with the Opening Prayer to Saint John Vianney)

**Scripture reflection:** 1 Peter 2:9 (reader:) But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's special possession, that you may declare the praises of Him who called you out of darkness into His wonderful light. (Pause for reflection)

## Responsory:

- L. As we embrace our own baptismal priesthood, we pray that you send us shepherds to lead your flock.
- R. Like our saintly patron of parish priests, a shepherd modeled after the Good Shepherd himself.

DAY FOUR (July 29, Wednesday) (Start with the Opening Prayer to Saint John Vianney)

**Scripture reflection:** Ephesians 4:31–32 (reader:) Get rid of all bitterness, rage and anger, brawling and slander, along with every form of malice. Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you. (Pause for reflection)

# Responsory:

- L. May we forgive one another from our hearts and together find the true path of peace.
- R. And never fail to imitate the gentleness of St. John Vianney who taught Christ-like forgiveness at all times.

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(Together all say:) Our Father..... | Hail Mary,..... | Glory be..... (leader: In the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit) All: Amen.

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DAY FIVE (July 30, Thursday) (Start with the Opening Prayer to Saint John Vianney)

# Responsory:

- L. During this time of anxiety, may we put our trust in God to save us from the ravages of disease.
- R. And imitate our saintly patron's commitment to abundant prayer and quiet contemplation.


