DEAR PARISH FAMILY,

This week's Gospel of Jesus feeding 5,000 people with just five loaves of bread sets the scene for Jesus' great Bread of Life Discourse in the Gospel of John, which we will hear for the next four Sundays. He multiplied these five loaves to teach his hearers about who He is: the new Passover who frees them from slavery to sin and death, the new Manna from heaven eaten in the form of His Body and Blood, the imperishable Eucharist that gives eternal life to all who eat of it.

Notice that, just as not all sources of physical nourishment are of equal importance, so also not all sources of spiritual nourishment are of equal importance. The Eucharist is the staple that should serve as the foundation for the rest of our spiritual life. Eat ordinary bread and you live one day longer. Those 5,000 whom Jesus fed by the Sea of Galilee were taken care of that day; but then on the following days as before, it was back to relying on themselves to put bread on the table. But eat Jesus' Bread of Life and you will live forever. Come to Jesus and you will never hunger for anything else because He will provide all you need. Rely on Him. Truly believe in Him. Put your faith and trust in Him, and you will never thirst for anything else ever again. Jesus is the Bread of God come down from heaven to give life to the world; us included. Jesus is truly present in the Sacrament of His Body and Blood, the foundation on which everything in the pyramid of a healthy spiritual life -- and for that matter, our eternal life is built.

HAPPY FEAST DAY: Today, as we celebrate the feast of our Patron, St. John Vianney, we discover that the secret of his greatness was in the love of prayer and the Eucharist. May we too be blessed as good stewards, sharing in the one bread and the one cup - Happy Feast Day!

Know your Catholic **Faith Corner**

Is Mass that Important? Ask St. John Vianney

This weekend as we celebrate the life of St. John Vianney, the second Vatican Council of 1962 explains that: The Eucharist needs to be the source and the summit of the Christian life, the beginning and the end, the starting point and goal. That's what characterized Saint John Vianney's life; that's what he tried to bring about in his people.

Pope John XXIII, in his encyclical letter on the 100th Anniversary of the death of St. John Vianney, wrote, "The devotion to prayer of St. John M. Vianney, who was to spend almost the whole of the last thirty years of his life in Church caring for the crowds of penitents who flocked to him, had one special characteristic: it was especially directed toward the Eucharist." He was devoted to the adorable Sacrament of the Altar with a burning charity and his soul was drawn to the Sacred Tabernacle by a heavenly force that could not be resisted. If you look at his catechesis, he spent far more time preaching about the Eucharist than about all other subjects put together. His hours spent in the confessional were not just so that he could reconcile the people to God, but rather, to prepare them to lead a Catholic life, which entails full participation in the Holy Mass by receiving Holy Communion worthily. Here are some beautiful quotes from St. John Vianney:

- If we really understood the Mass, we would die of joy.
- There is nothing so great as the Eucharist. If God had something more precious, He would have given it to us.
- "If we really loved the good God, we should make it our joy and happiness to come and spend a few moments to adore Him, and ask Him for the grace of forgiveness; and we should regard those moments as the happiest of our lives."

Hope you are all well and staying safe. This is a friendly reminder of the primary election on August 8th. Please cast your ballot if you have not done so yet.

Be sure to mail your ballot back before August 3rd If you are returning your ballot after August 3, don't mail it. Drop it off at a Voter Service Center or ballot drop off box to make sure it is received on time.

*Ballots must be received by 7 p.m. on Election Day, Aug. 8. Late ballots will not be counted. Postmarkdates are not accepted.

You can check the status of your ballot and download a HI Voted image at https://ballotstatus.hawaii.gov.

- *When filling out your ballot use a blue or black pen and completely fill in the rectangle next to the candidate you are voting for.
- *If you make a mistake, request a new ballot. Don't use whiteout or your vote may not count.
- *Pick and vote for only one political party or nonpartisan on the front of the ballot and vote for only on candidate in each race, except for the Kauai County Council.
- *Remember to sign the outside of your ballot envelope or your ballot might not count.
- *If you really want to vote in person or if you still need to register to vote, you can vote at a Voter Service Center.
- *Questions or need the locations of Voter Service Centers or ballot drop boxes near you? Call the Office of Elections at 808-453-VOTE or neighbor islands can call toll-free at 1-800-422-VOTE. You can also go online to elections.hawaii.gov.
- *Polling places will not be open on Election Day





St. John Vianney Parish Is celebrating its 58th Anniversary



Let us sing, pray and rejoice during all Masses this weekend

Congratulations to St. John Vianney Parish for serving Enchanted Lake and the surrounding area for 58 years. The parish presently has an active congregation of over 1,000 families. The first pastor of our parish was Fr. John Read who was followed by Fr. Patrick Freitas, Fr. Nathan Mamo, Fr. Joseph Grimaldi, Fr. Thomas Gross and by our current pastor Fr. Peter Miti.

Parish staff includes our pastor, a parish administrator, a parish secretary, a director of Religious Education and a Music director. We have a Finance Council, Pastoral Council and School Board which act as advisors to our pastor.

Ministries include Altar Servers, Lectors, Bereavement, Environment, Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion, Music, an RCIA team, Sacristans and Hospitality. Our programs include Faith Action, Parish Outreach, Knights of Columbus, Scouting, Seniors Young at Heart, the Sodality, St. Vincent DePaul and Prison Ministry.

The parish's four priorities are: Faith Formation, Leadership Development, Marriage and Family, and Youth and Young Adult.

A NEW PARISH IS CREATED TO SERVE THE GROWING KAILUA COMMUNITY

The Roman Catholic Diocese of Honolulu announced the newest parish in the islands, the second one in Kailua. The new parish was established to serve the newly developed area of Enchanted Lake and the growing Kailua community. Founded in August 1962, the parish was named St. John Vianney after the patron saint of all Catholic priests.

Mr. Joseph Pao pledged to donate the church, in memory of his parents Joe and Mary Pao. The Kailua Heights Joint Venture Company and the Kaelepulu Investment Company donated and developed four choice acres which comprised the parish campus.

The pastor of the new church was Fr. John B. Read, and the assistant pastor was Fr. Patrick Freitas. A residence for them was built simultaneously with the new church. The church building was completed and dedicated on February 24, 1963, in a beautiful ceremonial Mass, as a modern, functional, 425-seat building of steel and concrete construction.

At the end of its first year, the parish rejoiced in 135 Baptisms, 110 First Communicants, 75 Confirmed, 20 Converts, and had grown from 650 to 750 registered families.



ST. JOHN VIANNEY PARISH COMPLETELY RENOVATES ITS CHURCH

The Building Commission, and a few Liturgy members, decided on a design to remodel the church. Expansion by 2250 square feet would allow more room for movement at communion and other celebrations. The design included a permanent baptismal font, a Chapel of Adoration for the Blessed Sacrament and more space for the choir and musicians. There would also be an emphasis on keeping the church bright, including some stained glass. A new side main entrance with an overhanging canopy was planned, and the church's front would be redesigned. The cost estimate for the renovation was \$1.3-\$1.5 million. Parishioners were asked to donate to raise the necessary 50% of the total funds needed.

Construction on the church began in the summer of 2005, and Masses were conducted in the Parish Hall until its completion in 2006. Part of the architectural plan was to have artwork grace the outside of the church adjacent to the main church doors. The piece "Washing Feet" is dedicated to Barbara M. Akeo who worked as Parish Administrator for over 20 years. The piece "Serving the Needy" is dedicated to all the deceased members of the Sodality. The hope and prayer of our parish is that the theme of service will continue to be paramount for our parish and remind all of us that we are called to service through our baptism.

Therefore, whoever takes the lowly position of this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. (Pause for reflection)

Responsory:

L. Teach us to be humble, and to see with a child's heart the great deeds of God around us.

R. And give us the grace to imitate the humility of St. John Vianney.

(Together all say:) Our Father..... | Hail Mary,..... | Glory be..... (leader: In the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit) All: Amen. I (Conclude with the hymn to St. John Vianney at the end of this booklet)

DAY TWO (July 27, Monday) (Start with the Opening Prayer to Saint John Vianney)

Scripture reflection: 1 John 1:9 (reader:) If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness. (Pause for reflection)

Responsory:

- L. Help us to celebrate confession and the sacrament of penance frequently, so as to become closer to Christ's image.
- R. And never fail to trust in the grace of that sacrament so pastorally shared by St. John Vianney's patience in the confessional.

DAY THREE (July 28, Tuesday) (Start with the Opening Prayer to Saint John Vianney)

Scripture reflection: 1 Peter 2:9 (reader:) But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's special possession, that you may declare the praises of Him who called you out of darkness into His wonderful light. (Pause for reflection)

Responsory:

- L. As we embrace our own baptismal priesthood, we pray that you send us shepherds to lead your flock.
- R. Like our saintly patron of parish priests, a shepherd modeled after the Good Shepherd himself.

DAY FOUR (July 29, Wednesday) (Start with the Opening Prayer to Saint John Vianney)

Scripture reflection: Ephesians 4:31–32 (reader:) Get rid of all bitterness, rage and anger, brawling and slander, along with every form of malice. Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you. (Pause for reflection)

Responsory:

- L. May we forgive one another from our hearts and together find the true path of peace.
- R. And never fail to imitate the gentleness of St. John Vianney who taught Christ-like forgiveness at all times.


