DEAR PARISH FAMILY,

This Sunday we have a parable where we might shout: "Not fair!" How fair is it that no matter how long one worked in the vineyard, everyone would be paid the same? The parable, first of all needs to be understood against the background of the early Christians. Among these early Christians, there was some resentment on their part at the newcomers enjoying all the benefits with no tradition or life of observance behind them. One of the sad themes of Matthew's Gospel is that Jesus, himself an Israelite, first reached out to His own people but they rejected Him. He then turned to the Gentiles who accepted Him and showed very clearly that the Spirit of Jesus had come down upon them in abundance. Truly it could be said that "the first shall be last, and the last shall be first".

Nowadays, many people reading this Sunday's parable have problems with what seems to be quite an unfair treatment of the laborers. Our reaction under the influence of trade unionism and "fair play" generally is that those who have done more, who have given more, should get more than those who work for one hour. That is simple justice. Anything else is simply exploitation. And that is true, right? However, justice is the whole point of the parable and of Jesus' teaching. We have to learn what God's justice is like. Another name for God's justice is mercy and compassion. In the eyes of the world it can sometimes seem very unjust. The point being made is that things are not being measured according to individual output but according to need. All, early or late comers, have exactly the same need for God's mercy and God's love and everyone gets all of it. Since it cannot be measured, He gives it to us even when we do not deserve it.

Apologetics without Apology The Sacrament of Confirmation

Confirmation in the Eastern Church: In the Eastern Catholic and Eastern Orthodox Churches, the three sacraments of initiation are administered at the same time to infants. Children are baptized, confirmed, and receive Holy Communion in the form of the sacred blood, the consecrated wine, all in the same ceremony, and always in that order. This is often referred to as the original order.

Confirmation in the Western Church: Most of the church in the West came up with a different solution, the separation in time of the Sacrament of Confirmation from the Sacrament of Baptism. This has been the norm in the United States for more than 100 years. This allowed infants to be baptized soon after birth, while the bishop could confirm many Christians at the same time, even years after baptism. Eventually, the current custom of performing Confirmation several years after First Holy Communion developed, but the church continued to stress the original order of the Sacraments. Pope Benedict XVI, in his apostolic exhortation "Sacramentum Caritatis," suggested that the original order should be restored.

Original Order: Some dioceses in the United States are restoring that order, placing First Holy Communion and Confirmation, for example, in the second or third grade together. The U.S. Conference of Bishops allows for Confirmation of young people anytime between age 7 and 16, the desired practice of the local bishop being the deciding factor as to their members' Confirmation age. The Diocese of Honolulu is among those that have gone back to the original order and children in second grade can receive both the Sacraments of Confirmation and Holy Communion in the same ceremony.

40 DAYS FOR LIFE - FALL 2020 CAMPAIGN

The 40 Days for Life Fall 2020 campaign will take place from September 23 to November 1. This is a semi-annual event during which people of all denominations in upwards over 1000 cities in 63 countries around the world stand in compassionate solidarity to end abortion by converting, through prayer and without judgment, the hearts of those who are contemplating abortion and those who, directly or indirectly, promote or participate in the act of abortion. Hundreds of babies are saved during these campaigns with parents and relatives being spared the pain of abortion.

Please join us and thousands of people around the world in this global and impactful event. We can participate in a couple of ways throughout the 40 days of the campaign: 1) pray and fast alone or with family and friends, and/or 2) join others in prayer vigils by registering on the 40 Days for Life website (https://40daysforlife.com/honolulu) on those days and times that are convenient to you.

The *opening rally* for which we expect a significant turnout will be on **Saturday, September 26 from 9am-12pm.**

Matthew 20:1-16a

Jesus told his disciples this parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out at dawn to hire laborers for his vineyard. After agreeing with them for the usual daily wage, he sent them into his vineyard. Going out about nine o'clock, the landowner saw others standing idle in the marketplace, and he said to them, 'You too go into my vineyard, and I will give you what is just.' So they went off. And he went out again around noon, and around three o'clock, and did likewise. Going out about five o'clock, the landowner found others standing around, and said to them, 'Why do you stand here idle all day?' They answered, 'Because no one has hired us.' He said to them, 'You too go into my vineyard.' When it was evening the owner of the vineyard said to his foreman, 'Summon the laborers and give them their pay, beginning with the last and ending with the first.' When those who had started about five o'clock came, each received the usual daily wage. So when the first came, they thought that they would receive more, but each of them also got the usual wage. And on receiving it they grumbled against the landowner, saying, 'These last ones worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us, who bore the day's burden and the heat.' He said to one of them in reply, 'My friend, I am not cheating you. Did you not agree with me for the usual daily wage? Take what is yours and go. What if I wish to give this last one the same as you? Or am I not free to do as I wish with my own money? Are you envious because I am generous?' Thus, the last will be first, and the first will be last,"
