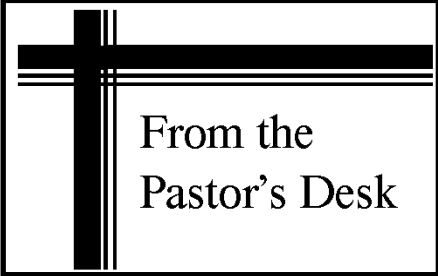

DEAR PARISH FAMILY,

This Sunday our readings are about God’s call, also known as vocation or discipleship. Vocation is not just for a few chosen people. And to say: “*There are no vocations now*” is simply not true. Everyone is called by God to be something, to do something for others with their life and with their unique gifts.

The First Reading (1 Samuel 3:3-10, 19) is about a young man, Samuel, called in the middle of the night, but did not recognize God’s call at first. Finally, he would respond and say: ‘*Speak, Lord, your servant is listening*’. He was ready to listen to God. Some people are called directly by God like Samuel. They can say: “*Here I am Lord. I have heard you calling in the night.*” In the Gospel, Jesus calls Andrew and it is Andrew who brings Peter to Jesus for the first time. Most of us have been brought to the Lord by people like Andrew. We were baptized as infants and brought to the Church by others. We grew up in the Church and were taught truths of the Faith by others. There was an “*Andrew*” in our life that the Lord used to reach us, to teach us and to guide us.

We all have been called to become an “*Andrew*” to someone. Inviting people to Christ and His Church is our privilege and responsibility. When we invite people, what is it that we are inviting them to? For some, we invite them to minister as priests, deacons, religious life or as a lay minister. Though the ministries might differ, the calling by virtue of our baptism is always to: love unconditionally, to forgive, to walk humbly with our God and to become the light that shines in the darkness of our world. Samuel and the disciples said *YES* to the calling. May we always be attentive and respond with generosity to our own calling when the Lord calls.

Apologetics Without Apology



Year of Reading the Bible

Sunday Readings: 1Samuel 3:3b-10,19; John 1:35-42. (1st Reading & Gospel)

What can we learn from this Sunday's readings, particularly the first and the Gospel? Is it not about the theme of *listening*? How well do we listen? The Prophet Samuel, Andrew and Simon Peter experienced a moment of active listening, discerning and action to the call.

To be called does not require perfection, only fidelity and holy listening. Samuel and the prophets of Israel, the fishermen of Galilee and even the tax collectors that Jesus called were certainly not called because of their qualifications or achievements. Paul says that Jesus calls "*the foolish*," so that the wise will be shamed. It is a dynamic call that involves a total response on our part. When we respond, we will never be the same because he has loved us, changed us and made us into his image. And because he has called us, we have no choice but to call others to follow him.

We are never called for our own sake, but for the sake of others. Israel was called by God for the benefit of the godless around it. God calls all Christians for the sake of the world in which we live.

Application: How have you been called away from the routine of your life, away from the frustrations of daily living and work? What new purpose do you find emerging in your life because of the ways God has called you? Through whom have you encountered the call of the Lord in your life? Have you called anyone to follow the Lord recently?

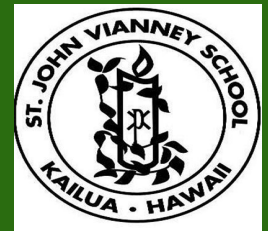

Therefore, we have a **deficit** of **\$2,189**.

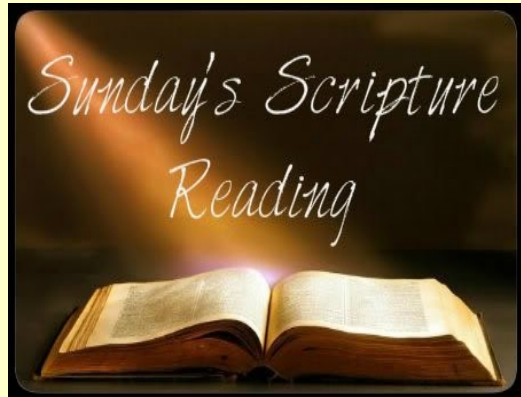

Reading I

1 Sm 3:3b-10, 19

Samuel was sleeping in the temple of the LORD where the ark of God was.

The LORD called to Samuel, who answered, "Here I am."

Samuel ran to Eli and said, "Here I am. You called me."

"I did not call you," Eli said. "Go back to sleep."

So he went back to sleep.

Again the LORD called Samuel, who rose and went to Eli.

"Here I am," he said. "You called me."

But Eli answered, "I did not call you, my son. Go back to sleep."

At that time Samuel was not familiar with the LORD, because the LORD had not revealed anything to him as yet.

The LORD called Samuel again, for the third time.

Getting up and going to Eli, he said, "Here I am. You called me."

Then Eli understood that the LORD was calling the youth.

So he said to Samuel, "Go to sleep, and if you are called, reply,

Speak, LORD, for your servant is listening."

When Samuel went to sleep in his place,

the LORD came and revealed his presence,

calling out as before, "Samuel, Samuel!"

Samuel answered, "Speak, for your servant is listening."

Samuel grew up, and the LORD was with him,

you will be called Cephas" — which is translated Peter.

FOR COMMUNITY EQUITY

As you know, this has been an unprecedented time of stress and hardship for Americans -- social isolation, job loss, home schooling, illness and death of loved ones, fear of and confusion about a rampaging pandemic. A crisis card and flyer have been developed (attached) to help folks in Hawaii get assistance for domestic violence, child abuse, mental health challenges, substance use, suicidal feelings, trafficking, and parenting stress. A donor has generously donated the costs of printing these for you and your congregations. Please let us know how many you want and to what mailing address they should be sent. (Feel free to use these any way you want -- reproduce yourself, use in social media, etc.) Following are data that document how great the need is -- and how much people are suffering:

- Self-reported symptoms of anxiety have tripled and of depressive disorder have quadrupled (CDC, August 14, 2020)
- Suicidal ideation has doubled, with young people at highest risk. A NYTimes article recently highlighted suicides among student athletes.
- Guns are responsible for half of all suicides. Gun sales have almost doubled during the pandemic.
- Among Black residents of Baltimore, suicide deaths doubled during the first lockdown, March-May, while White suicides appeared to drop by half.

• **Overall: younger adults, people of color, essential workers, and unpaid adult caregivers reported disproportionately worse mental health outcomes, increased substance use, and elevated suicidal ideation.**

- Domestic Violence: Reports of domestic violence increases have varied: several cities reported 20-27% increase, New York City's DV online resource saw site visits more than double, and Houston reported a 357 percent increase in emergency placements for those fleeing abuse. At the same time, shelters have had reduced capacity due to safety protocols.
- Child abuse: While official reports of child abuse have dropped across the country (since most child abuse is identified by school or health care staff), calls to the ChildHelp National Child Abuse Hotline increased by 31% in March, 17% in April, and 43% in May, compared to 2019.
- Substance use: In March 2020, there was a 54% increase in national sales of alcohol compared to March 2019.

- In one survey of 1,000 people, half self-reported an increase in past-month alcohol consumption and one-third reported an increase in illicit drug use.
- Overdose deaths, May 2020 compared to May 2019: Overdose deaths involving cocaine increased by 1/4, meth deaths increased by 1/3, and synthetic opioid-involved deaths rose 38%. The *Washington Post* reported a 42% increase in overdose deaths in Washington DC, and 10 western states reported over a 98% increase in synthetic opioid-involved death.
- There has been an enormous impact on the mental health of frontline health workers: a national survey of 1,119 healthcare workers showed that 93% were experiencing stress; 86% reported experiencing anxiety; 77% reported frustration; 76% reported exhaustion and burnout; and 75% said they were overwhelmed.

Your distribution of these cards will help many people access the assistance they need in this time of immeasurable stress and suffering.
