

#### DEAR PARISH FAMILY,

On this first Sunday of Lent, we all realize how busy our lives can be and have been. We welcome Lent as a time to make our faith fresh! We know it can be difficult at times to resist temptation. So many things require our time and attention. And so many things call us with the voice of persuasion: promising to make life less painful, less onerous or less costly. The struggle to make the right choices can be difficult. In the Book of Genesis, before the flood, Adam and Eve faltered. Given everything in the Garden of Eden, they were tempted with the possibility of more, and so they committed the first sin of pride, which was disobedience.

In the Gospel reading, Jesus did not give in to temptation while in the desert. Instead, He countered that first sin of disobedience with an act of perfect obedience – an obedience that would resist every temptation throughout the whole of his earthly life. We all face our own deserts with their unique temptations. At such moments, we all have a choice; the choice to give in or to resist. But we cannot do it alone. Inasmuch as we share in the life of Christ, we have a model in Jesus and an advocate in the Holy Spirit. We should always ask Jesus to grant us the grace to refuse to let our love be clouded by the empty promises of the devil.

**Blessed:** This Sunday, we are blessed to have our catechumens begin their intense journey toward becoming full members of the Church at the Easter Vigil. Please remember them in your prayers.

# Know your Catholic Faith Corner



Apologetics Without Apology Year of Reading the Bible

#### Genesis 9:8-15; 1 Peter 3:18-22; Mark 1:12-15

In the book Preaching the New Lectionary, Dianne Bergant points out that the Sunday readings in this Lenten liturgical cycle reflect on the covenants God has offered humankind throughout the ages. Covenant is the deepest and most unique concept in the Hebrew religious tradition. It is a free promise on God's part. God's covenant offer does not depend on humanity's response. In the First Reading, we find a covenant promise God makes to Noah, not because they deserve this promise but because the chosen people are simply that, chosen by God for His sovereign motives. The essence of the covenant God established at the time of Noah was just that, eternal compassion. Being open to that will give them a rich life. Anytime we think of ourselves as a part of God's chosen people, that very thought should bring us to our knees in gratitude for the gift we could never deserve. May the Sundays of Lent help us reflect on God's covenants and Israel's growing understanding. Let us also reflect on what they say to us today.

Mark 1:12-15: The Gospel gives us the shortest of the three Gospel accounts of Jesus' 40-day sojourn in the desert. In it, Mark reminds us that we ought to follow the path of Jesus in the desert where we learn how to stay on course with God's covenant. The desert is a place of testing where all the usual signs of God's presence seem absent; it is where a person must seek God in the midst of adversity.

Reflection: Lent is a time to remember that God first reached out to us not as a meagre, one-time gesture, but a profound, lasting and healing covenant. We ponder in deep prayer and silence how God has invested everything, including a beloved Son, into this relationship.




# Stewardship of Treasure

Reading I

God said to Noah and to his sons with him:

"See, I am now establishing my covenant with you

and your descendants after you

and with every living creature that was with you:

all the birds, and the various tame and wild animals

that were with you and came out of the ark.

I will establish my covenant with you,

that never again shall all bodily creatures be destroyed

by the waters of a flood;

there shall not be another flood to devastate the earth." God added:

"This is the sign that I am giving for all ages to come,

of the covenant between me and you

and every living creature with you:

I set my bow in the clouds to serve as a sign

of the covenant between me and the earth.

When I bring clouds over the earth,

and the bow appears in the clouds,

Reading II

1 Pt 3:18-22

Beloved:

Christ suffered for sins once,

who had once been disobedient

while God patiently waited in the days of Noah

## **FASTING**

In the dioceses in the United States, Catholics aged 18 through 59 are bound to fast on both Ash Wednesday (February 17, 2021) and Good Friday (April 2, 2021). To fast means to consume one full meal a day at most, although taking of other, smaller quantities of food at the other customary mealtimes is permitted. Food and drink between meals (except water and medicine) is not permitted on fast days.

#### **ABSTINENCE FROM MEAT**

Catholics aged 14 and up are to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, all Fridays of Lent, Good Friday. To abstain means refraining from eating beef, veal, pork, or poultry at least, although eggs and milk products are acceptable. The consumption of fish and shellfish is permitted, though the penitential character of the abstinence should be kept in mind.

#### **LENTEN PRACTICES**

The faithful are encouraged during Lent to attend daily Mass, receive Holy Communion, participate in penance services, and receive sacramental absolution; to take part in public and private exercises of piety, give generously to works of religion and charity, perform acts of kindness toward the sick, aged, and the poor; to practice voluntary self-denial, especially regarding food, drink, and worldly amusements; and to pray more fervently, particularly for the intentions of the Holy Father.



#### The Scrutinies

The Scrutinies are rites of conversion and repentance. They include prayers of intercession and exprcism and are intended to deliver the elect from sin, protect them from temptation and invite them closer to Christ.



Sunday, March 6....5:00 p.m. Mass The prayers for the Elect at the 1st Scrutiny are for recognizing their thirst, a thirst we all share-- a thirst that only Jesus can satisfy. At the well, the Samaritan woman hears Jesus then goes and tells the villagers what she has heard, causing them to seek him out for themselves.



Sunday, March 14...11:00 am Mass The prayers for the Elect at the 2" Scrutiny are prayers are for spiritual sight. The man healed of his blindness gradually grows to see as Christ sees. By the end of the story, the one who healed him was "Lord" (John 9:38) in whom he believed.

#### Third Scrutiny: 5th Sunday of Lent

Sunday, March 21 ....9 am Mass The prayers for the Elect at the 3" Scrutiny are for a new life in Christ, in the story of the raising of Lazarus, we come to the final days before the elect must stand before the font and profess their faith.



#### Who can donate?

If you've previously tested positive for COVID-19 and are now healthy and have been symptom-free for more than 28 days, your community needs your blood.

#### How do I schedule an appointment?

Call (808) 848-4706 or email COVIDplasma@bbh.org and say that you recovered from COVID-19 and you want to help. You can also learn more at bbh.org/FightCovid.

#### What is the donation process like?

It's a simple process and it will take place at Blood Bank of Hawaii's Dillingham Donor Center, Young Street Donor Center, Waikele Bloodmobile or possibly at a blood drive near you. First, you'll answer some health questions. Next, you'll sit back in a comfortable chair and relax or watch a movie for about an hour while they draw the plasma from your blood. When it's done, you'll enjoy some light refreshments.

#### Faith Action Task Force Update -- Housing

HousingNOW! is the Faith Action Task Force to address housing issues. Its five Steering Committee-approved issues include: 1) an empty homes fee; 2) a community-led housing mandate; and 3) the affordable, locally owned homes for all (A.L.O.H.A.) Homes proposal. Taxation of real estate investment trusts (REITs), corporations profiting off revenue-generating realestate investments, has returned as a fourth issue for Faith Action. The fifth issue is the redevelopment of Aloha Stadium into the New Aloha Stadium Entertainment District (NASED).
