

DEAR PARISH FAMILY,

This Sunday's readings remind us of mountain top experiences. In the first reading, on the mountain in the land of Moriah, Abraham is put to the test by God to see if he would be willing to sacrifice his own son Isaac; and without hesitation he faithfully obeyed. But in a dramatic fashion Isaac's life is spared, and a substitute is found for the holocaust. Abraham is rewarded for his unstinting faith. In the second reading, St. Paul alludes indirectly to another small mount. The evangelists call it Golgotha. From this mount, the Lord would bring salvation to the human race. And in the Gospel, on an unnamed mountain, Jesus appeared in His glory, transfigured along with Moses and Elijah.

Perhaps, you and I can see clearly that the transfiguration is a foreshadowing of the Resurrection. Yet Peter, James, and John see things differently. At this point in their lives, the disciples had been following Jesus for quite some time. They had already endured many trials, and yet they still weren't sure where this journey would take them. It is for this reason they were invited by Jesus to see the reason for following Him. This splendid episode offered a hint of where they were headed, heaven. Peter, mesmerized by the sight he saw, did not want to go down the mountain to painful moments. Who would?

Each of us is like Peter at times, wanting a life that is pain-free and trouble-free. However, as He does continually throughout the Gospel, Jesus corrects Peter. He basically says to him: "You cannot stop on this mountain; we have work to be done down in the community before we can finally taste heaven eternally." Lent is a time when we are reminded that our true homeland is to be with God eternally in heaven. In the meantime, like the faithful Abraham, we have work to do.

Know your Catholic Faith Corner



Apologetics Without Apology Year of Reading the Bible

GENESIS 22:1-2, 9-13, 15-18; ROMANS 8:31-34; MARK 9:2-10

While the **First Reading** is a masterpiece of narrative art, for some it can present a troubling image of God. Abraham may display faith and obedience to an admirable degree but what are we to think of a divinity who tests him by letting him believe till the very last moment that he must kill and sacrifice his only son? Traditional theology would probably respond that God is God, unanswerable to human categories of judgment, but many will likely remain rather disturbed. It is probably best to concentrate in first instance on the faith of Abraham, rather than on God. There is an exchange between Isaac and his father as they climb the mountain (vv. 7-8). The boy points out the lack of a lamb for sacrifice. Abraham's enigmatic response, 'My son. God himself will provide', serves at one level to keep the boy guessing. But more deeply it reveals the depth of the patriarch's faith. He somewhat believed that somehow his future, which hang entirely on this only, God-given son, remains in the hands of God.

Are there parallels and similarities between the First Reading and the Gospel? Do you see a tie in between Abraham almost sacrificing Isaac and God sacrificing Jesus? Mark's account of the Transfiguration, also reveals God's only Son who knew pain and suffering in whom a command is given to 'Listen to him!' Just like Isaac, Abraham's son, the only 'beloved Son' is not exempt from suffering as part of the divine plan of salvation. Abraham "took the wood for the burnt offering and placed it on his son Isaac." Jesus carries his own cross. Isaac asks, "Where is the lamb for the burnt offering?" John refers to Jesus as "the Lamb of God" (see John 1:29). Isaac is obedient to his father: Jesus is obedient to his Father. Look out for more parallels in the two readings.



Reading I

Gn 22:1-2, 9a, 10-13, 15-18

God put Abraham to the test.

He called to him, "Abraham!"

"Here I am!" he replied.

Then God said:

"Take your son Isaac, your only one, whom you love,

There you shall offer him up as a holocaust

on a height that I will point out to you."

When they came to the place of which God had told him,

But the LORD's messenger called to him from heaven,

"Abraham, Abraham!"

"Here I am!" he answered.

"Do not lay your hand on the boy," said the messenger.

I know now how devoted you are to God,

since you did not withhold from me your own beloved son."

As Abraham looked about,

he spied a ram caught by its horns in the thicket.

So he went and took the ram

and offered it up as a holocaust in place of his son.

Gospel

Mk 9:2-10

Jesus took Peter, James, and John and led them up a high mountain apart by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no fuller on earth could bleach them. Then Elijah appeared to them along with Moses, and they were conversing with Jesus. Then Peter said to Jesus in reply, "Rabbi, it is good that we are here! Let us make three tents: one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." He hardly knew what to say, they were so terrified. Then a cloud came, casting a shadow over them; from the cloud came a voice, 'This is my beloved Son. Listen to him.' Suddenly, looking around, they no longer saw anyone but Jesus alone with them. As they were coming down from the mountain,

except when the Son of Man had risen from the dead.

So they kept the matter to themselves,

questioning what rising from the dead meant.

he charged them not to relate what they had seen to anyone,

FIRST SCRUTINY: 3RD SUNDAY OF LENT SATURDAY, MARCH 6, 2021— 5:00PM MASS


The prayers for the Elect at the 1st Scrutiny are for recognizing their thirst, a thirst we all share — a thirst that only Jesus can satisfy. At the well, the Samaritan woman hears Jesus then goes and tells the villagers what she has heard, causing them to seek him out for themselves.

SECOND SCRUTINY: 4TH SUNDAY OF LENT SUNDAY, MARCH 14, 2021 — 11:00AM MASS

The prayers for the Elect at the 2nd Scrutiny are prayers for spiritual sight. The man healed of his blindness gradually grows to see as Christ sees. By the end of the story, the one who healed him was "Lord" (John 9:38) in whom he believed.

THIRD SCRUTINY: 5TH SUNDAY OF LENT SUNDAY, MARCH 21, 2021 — 9AM MASS

The prayers for the Elect at the 3rd Scrutiny are for a new life in Christ. In the story of the raising of Lazarus, we come to the final days before the elect must stand before the font and profess their faith.

Heard about Medjugorje but want to know more? Don't know what it is but interested in learning what it's all about (or just how to pronounce it?) Then please join us!

On June 24, 1981, in a small village in Bosnia -Hercegovina named Medjugorje, the Blessed Virgin Mary began appearing to six youth - Ivan, Jakov, Marija, Mirjana, Vicka, and Ivanka - giving them messages to share with the world. Blessed Mother told them that God has sent Her to our world, and these years She is spending with us are a time of Grace granted by God.







Because the apparitions are ongoing (Marija receives daily visits from Our Lady while the other visionaries receive messages on designated dates) and other factors, the Catholic Church has not yet officially approved these apparitions but in May 2019, Pope Francis authorized pilgrimages to Medjugorje moving them from a private/personal capacity to one which can now be officially organized by dioceses and parishes.

2021 marks the 40th year of Our Lady's apparitions in Medjugorje and some feel this significant time marker (40 years) may mean Our Lady's visitations to earth may end this year. This no-obligation info session will provide logistics and answers to the many questions involving such a long trip for us from Kailua to Croatia as well as personal accounts from those who have already visited this holy place. St. John Vianney Parish **Representative to Faith Action for Community Equity**



Kathy Jaycox has been a parishioner at St John Vianney since moving here from Chicago 1992. She serves as our parish representative to Faith Action for Community Equity, an interdenominational coalition focused on issues of social justice.

Our parish joined Faith Action in 1998, two years after its founding. Kathy's involvement began in the early 2000's. When asked why she chose to commit her time to Faith Action, Kathy responded that it provides a structure through which she can put her faith into action. She said, "I was moved by the covenant statement, the agreement signed by every church, temple or organization that joins Faith Action." This covenant states, in part, that Faith Action member organizations will "examine core issues and the root causes of problems, and [will] be a vehicle through which our people can act to improve quality of life."

Kathy uses this analogy to explain the work of Faith Action. We are all familiar with the story of the Good Samaritan, who helped the Jewish robbery victim by binding his wounds and providing for his follow-up care. Well, Faith Action is NOT like the Good Samaritan. It does not provide direct help, such as feeding the hungry or building homes. But Faith Action is a coalition of caring neighbors who ask the Good Samaritan and all others in the Bible story, "How did this happen to the victim and what can we do to insure that no one else gets abused in this way?"

So Faith Action looks at the social justice challenges facing our community (e.g., costs of long-term care, access to affordable workforce housing, environmental climate concerns) and says, in essence, here are two things we can do. First, we can voice our concerns and suggest solutions to those who shape public policy at the local, state and federal level. And second, through our issues-based task forces, we can develop leaders from within our churches and temples who will help others to find and develop their own voices in support of justice and compassion.
