Dear Parish Family,

Happy Ascension Sunday! Mission accomplished!

Though Jesus would have wanted to do more with his physical presence here on earth, the mission he was sent to do had somewhat come to an end. At this time, he was returning back to his original glory and he promised his disciples: *"I am going to prepare a place for you."* This only shows that, although our lives may take different twists and turns, our destination is the same, union with God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

However, where Jesus' mission ends here on earth, a new journey begins for us. This Sunday's readings have a clear reminder to the disciples and all those who would believe: "...and you will be my witnesses ... to the ends of the earth." To be a witness of Jesus, is both a privilege and an obligation. This honor, bestowed on us, can for the most part be scary because many times we all feel unworthy. And truth be told, that is why we need the Church because it is there where we acknowledge our unworthiness, and only by the grace of God through the sacraments, we are made worthy. This clearly shows that it was Jesus' intent to pass on the torch to be kept burning brightly for us. Jesus, being realistic, knew very well that the work and mission he was handing over would be challenging and difficult at times, leading some to want to give up or quit. It is for this reason that he promised them the gift of the Holy Spirit to help them in this urgent and important mission.

Next Sunday at *Pentecost*, we will see how we are never alone, in health and sickness, in poverty and in riches, laboring as stewards in the Lord's vineyard.

Apologetics Without Apology Year of Reading the Bible

Acts 1:1-11; Ephesians 1:17-23; Mark 16:15-20 (Ascension of the Lord)

The Ascension is the dramatic departure of the risen Christ from His earthly, bodily ministry among His followers. It is important to realize that the ascension of Christ had always been a part of the overall plan of God found in the prophecies of the Old Testament. The idea of the ascension was not some last minute idea thought up by hapless and hopeless disciples. Isaiah 52:13 states: "Behold, My servant will prosper, He will be high and lifted up, and greatly exalted."

Since His birth in Bethlehem by the miracle of the incarnation, Christ had lived physically on earth, but 40 days after the resurrection, His earthly ministry would cease (Mark 16:19; Luke 24:50-51; Acts 1:9-11). To a large extent the ascension was for the benefit of Jesus' followers because he would be present to them, no longer with a physical presence, but through the Spirit. They must now wait for the promised Holy Spirit through whom the work of Jesus would continue. After Jesus ascended, there was the urgency to share the gospel with every creature. This mission of sharing a wonderful message of joy and life is still an active job description to all his followers in every generation. As you prepare to share it, it will not be an easy task, but will be very fulfilling.

Questions for Reflection:

- What makes it easier to share your faith with some people than with others?
- Is there anyone in your "world" whom you think needs to hear the Gospel message?

What are some non-verbal ways you can help your friends know about Jesus?




Gospel

Jesus said to his disciples: "Go into the whole world

and proclaim the gospel to every creature. Whoever believes and is baptized will be saved; whoever does not believe will be condemned. These signs will accompany those who believe: in my name they will drive out demons, they will speak new languages. They will pick up serpents with their hands, and if they drink any deadly thing, it will not harm them. They will lay hands on the sick, and they will recover." During the Month of May, the women of the Sodality of Our Blessed Lady will pray the Rosary after the 8 a.m. Mass on Saturday mornings.

We invite you to come to Mass and pray the Rosary with us.

Please mark your calendars. Bring your Rosary, wear your mask and we will continue to observe 6' distancing.

A plenary indulgence is granted if the Rosary is recited in a church, a public oratory, a family group.

PLENARY INDULGENCE

The word "plenary" means "complete," relating to the complete remission of punishment for sins. The word "indulgence" comes from a Latin word, "indulgentia," which means "pardon." An indulgence is a gracious pardon, or dismissal, of the effects of sin. It can remove all the temporal punishment due to forgiven sin.

No one but God knows for certain when a plenary indulgence is actually gained, because only he knows whether a person's dispositions are adequate. A plenary indulgence can be gained only once a day.

To receive a plenary indulgence it is necessary to perform the work to which the indulgence is attached and to fulfill three conditions:

- 1. Sacramental confession,
- 2. Eucharistic Communion, and
- 3. Prayer for the intentions of the Supreme Pontiff, all to be performed within days of each other if not at the same time.

These conditions may be satisfied several days before or after the performance of the prescribed work, though preferably Communion should be received and the prayers offered for the Pope on the same day as the indulgenced work. It is further required that all attachment to sin, even to venial sin, be absent.



Important: Every new Rosary must be blessed by a Catholic priest in order for it to be a SACRAMENTAL, which means that it carries the blessing of the "prayer of the Church".

"A Year of St. Joseph"



Pope Francis has declared "A Year of St. Joseph" to be observed through December 8, 2021. He was a humble man who was so near to Jesus and Mary and connected with their lives. Deacon Formation

Aloha and welcome to the Office of Permanent Deacon Formation website!

The Office of Permanent Deacon Formation is responsible for coordination of recruitment, screening, selection and formation of candidates for the Permanent Diaconate.

The Permanent Deacon Formation Program is directed at preparing men spiritually, academically and pastorally for ordination and to assist the Church in its mission of salvation of souls. Men who are called and chosen will be formed and sent to teach, to guard and to bear witness to, and to serve Holy Mother the Church through the example of their lives and their ministries of Word, service and charity.

Diaconal ministry works hand in hand with both priestly and lay ministry as a sacrament to bring about the kingdom of God. Deacons are men with a charism and a calling to radical availability for service to the People of God, the Church. The deacon's vocation calls him to collaborate with the bishop and the priests in an exercise of a ministry which is not of their own, but the Word of God—calling all to conversion and holiness. It is a ministry of reconciliation, of outreach to the most marginalized and those most in need of care, of education and justice. The Diaconate was not re-instituted because we have a shortage of priests or lay ministers. It was restored as "a living icon of Christ the Servant within the Church…a visible sign or sacrament of the Lord Christ himself."


WELCOME KURT, FRANCIS AND TAYLOR!

Dear Brothers and Sisters,



The month of May is approaching, a time when the People of God express with particular intensity their love and devotion for the Blessed Virgin Mary. It is traditional in this month to pray the Rosary at home within the family. The restrictions of the pandemic have made us come to appreciate all the more this "family" aspect, also from a spiritual point of view.



For this reason, I want to encourage everyone to rediscover the beauty of praying the Rosary at home in the month of May. This can be done either as a group or individually; you can decide according to your own situations, making the most of both opportunities. The key to doing this is always simplicity, and it is easy also on the internet to find good models of prayers to follow.

I am also providing two prayers to Our Lady that you can recite at the end of the Rosary, and that I myself will pray in the month of May, in spiritual union with all of you. I include them with this letter so that they are available to everyone.

Dear brothers and sisters, contemplating the face of Christ with the heart of Mary our Mother will make us even more united as a spiritual family and will help us overcome this time of trial. I keep all of you in my prayers, especially those suffering most greatly, and I ask you, please, to pray for me. I thank you, and with great affection I send you my blessing.

<u>First Prayer to Our Lady</u> O Marv.

You shine continuously on our journey as a sign of salvation and hope. We entrust ourselves to you, Health of the sick, who, at the foot of the cross, were united with Jesus' suffering, and persevered in your faith. "Protectress of the Roman people", you know our needs, and we know that you will provide, so that, as at Cana in Galilee, joy and celebration may return after this time of trial.

Help us, Mother of Divine Love, to conform ourselves to the will of the Father and to do what Jesus tells us. For he took upon himself our suffering, and burdened himself with our sorrows to bring us, through the cross, to the joy of the Resurrection. Amen. We fly to your protection, O Holy Mother of God; Do not despise our petitions in our necessities, but deliver us always from every danger, O Glorious and Blessed Virgin.

The Second Prayer



"We fly to your protection, O Holy Mother of God".

In the present tragic situation, when the whole world is prey to suffering and anxiety, we fly to you, Mother of God and our Mother, and seek refuge under your protection. Virgin Mary, turn your merciful eyes towards us amid this coronavirus pandemic. Comfort those who are distraught and mourn their loved ones who have died, and at times are buried in a way that grieves them deeply. Be close to those who are concerned for their loved ones who are sick and who, in order to prevent the spread of the disease, cannot be close to them. Fill with hope those who are troubled by the uncertainty of the future and the consequences for the economy and employment.

Mother of God and our Mother, pray for us to God, the Father of mercies, that this great suffering may end and that hope and peace may dawn anew. Plead with your divine Son, as you did at Cana, so that the families of the sick and the victims be comforted, and their hearts be opened to confidence and trust.

Protect those doctors, nurses, health workers and volunteers who are on the frontline of this emergency, and are risking their lives to save others. Support their heroic effort and grant them strength, generosity and continued health. Be close to those who assist the sick night and day, and to priests who, in their pastoral concern and fidelity to the Gospel, are trying to help and support everyone. Blessed Virgin, illumine the minds of men and women engaged in scientific research, that they may find effective solutions to overcome this virus.

Support national leaders, that with wisdom, solicitude and generosity they may come to the aid of those lacking the basic necessities of life and may devise social and economic solutions inspired by farsightedness and solidarity.

Mary Most Holy, stir our consciences, so that the enormous funds invested in developing and stockpiling arms will instead be spent on promoting effective research on how to prevent similar tragedies from occurring in the future.

Beloved Mother, help us realize that we are all members of one great family and to recognize the bond that unites us, so that, in a spirit of fraternity and solidarity, we can help to alleviate countless situations of poverty and need. Make us strong in faith, persevering in service, constant in prayer.

Mary, Consolation of the afflicted, embrace all your children in distress and pray that God will stretch out his all-powerful hand and free us from this terrible pandemic, so that life can serenely resume its normal course.

To you, who shine on our journey as a sign of salvation and hope, do we entrust ourselves, O Clement, O Loving, O Sweet Virgin Mary. Amen.
