From the Pastor's Desk

#### Dear Parish Family,

In Christ

Most of us have known the experience of feeling powerless in the face of rejection, especially when it is rejection from those closest to us. Earlier in the gospel, before this Sunday's, Jesus is misunderstood by his family who, along with the Jerusalem leaders, think he is out of his mind. When his family comes to take him away, he leaves them waiting outside and continues to teach about a new sort of kinship.

This Sunday, it is the neighbors and friends of Jesus' family who have trouble coping with him. While they admitted that his teaching demonstrated considerable wisdom, and he demonstrated extraordinary power as a healer, they observed that something did not add up. After all, he was basically just one of them. He experienced their response as rejection and by so doing, identified himself with the rejected prophets of old. The townspeople's lack of faith rendered the prophet, Jesus, powerless and he simply was unable to perform any mighty deeds among them, apart from some few who did have faith.

At times, we may be like Jesus, bringing the wisdom and power of God to our families or local communities, only to be met with rejection. Or we may be like the few who come in faith, and experience a healing touch. At other times, we may replicate the behavior of the opponents of Jesus. Humans are said to be adept at putting tall poppies down, discounting the achievements of those who excel. It is always a good idea to look into ourselves in order to check whether or not we are mirroring the behavior of the people of Jesus' hometown. May we always aid and acknowledge the power of God at work, even in the lives of those closest to us; our neighbors and our friends. Saint John Vianney Parish, a Christian Community in the Roman Catholic tradition, motivated by the love of God, provides opportunities in worship, education, ministry and outreach for its parishioners and the community at large.

### Know your Catholic Faith Corner

Apologetics without apology A Year of Reading the Bible

Ezekiel 2:2-5; 2 Corinthians 12:7-10; Mark 6:1-6

Scripture background: Ezekiel was a prophet during the period of the Exile in Israel's history. This was a tumultuous time for the Israelites as their identity was stripped from them by the foreign superpower of Babylon. The exile was a consequence of the people's rebellion against God. There was no more Temple in their midst. In the midst of the rebellion of most of the nation of Israel, Ezekiel was called to proclaim the truth of God to them. God chose Ezekiel to speak the power-filled word to the people. The first reading recounts the call of Ezekiel to this challenging mission. He was to proclaim the word of the Lord to the people, regardless of whether they heeded it or not. He courageously accepted that mission but it received overwhelming rejection.

In the gospel we hear about Jesus returning to His hometown of Nazareth. Despite the powerful signs and the authoritative teaching Jesus conveyed in His hometown's

synagogue, the people there still expressed disbelief. The main reason for their lack of faith was their close familiarity with Jesus. They could not fathom that the "carpenter, the son of Mary," whom they had seen grow up in their midst could be such an extraordinary prophet. Jesus quoted the Old Testament to illustrate what He experienced:

"A prophet is not without honor except in his native place and among his own kin and in his own house."

This can be true of our own experiences too. Is it not most difficult to witness to our faith among those who are closest to us?

# Misunderstanding of the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick continued...

The Anointing of the Sick involves using Oil of the Sick (*oleum infirmorum - Ol*) - olive oil blessed by the bishop during Holy Week. Anointing with oil is not a magical or good-luck gesture but a sincere sign of supernatural assistance to coincide with the physical medicine and treatment already given. (Those suffering are reminded of the words of St. Paul: Col. 1:24, 2 Cor. 1:5.) Catholic Christians believe in redemptive suffering, whereby a person willingly offers up their personal aches and pains, trials and tribulations with Christ on the Cross.

Who can be anointed? Because many sick and injured people recover nowadays, or may go into remission, *Baptized Catholics* are able to receive the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick more than once - as many times as needed. The elderly, people with many ailments, and those with deadly or serious disease, chronic pain and suffering, or recurring illness, can and should be anointed often. Some Catholics see Anointing of the Sick as a "spiritual oil change" and feel that every three months (or 3000 miles) is a good time to anoint the bedridden, people in nursing homes, and others with chronic and pathological conditions. The Sacrament of the Sick is for those in danger of death or in serious and critical condition, medically speaking, (before surgery, for example). In minor cases, a prayer for healing is appropriate. The sacrament should not be overused or trivialized for every upset stomach or aching toe.

The right time and setting for anointing: Anointing can take place at any time. The setting for the rite of anointing can be performed within the context of the liturgy of the Eucharist/Mass or outside of it. It can be in a hospital, nursing care facility, hospice, at home or by appointment.

This is a beautiful Sacrament that bestows important graces to all the living until the moment of death. It strengthens us along the journey of life. Let us not be afraid of it. Let us not wait until it is too late to call the priest. "Behold, now is the acceptable time; behold, now is the day of salvation." (2 Corinthians 6:2)

### Let's Celebrate Faith Action's 25 Years

Dear Friends,

Faith Action for Community Equity will arrive at a major milestone –and we want you to be a part of this great moment.

This July marks Faith Action's 25th anniversary. Its beginning was formed when multiple faith communities came together and essentially declared, "We must get to the root causes of injustices—the brokenness -- we see in our communities." This meant mobilizing hundreds of volunteers to be a part of the public decision-making processes that determine who will have a decent home, who will find a job with a living wage, who will receive a quality education, who will live in a healthy life-affirming environment.

Now is the time to celebrate our accomplishments through Faith Action.

Volunteers have stepped up to plan this celebration which will come in two parts:

Part I (July/August/Sept 2021): Celebrate by reviewing Faith Action's inspiring history and accomplishments through videos and webinars. We need expertise to create these products.

Part II (November 2021) : Depending on COVID's status, celebrate in person with music, video, entertainment, food, and merriment. We need event planners here.

## Housing Opinion Survey Results: What's next?

Faith Action's HousingNOW! Task Force asked for your opinions about various housing issues. Your initial responses were immediately compared to the HousingNOW! position on each issue. If you did not initially agree, you were presented with additional information and given a chance to change your response. The task force will be writing a series of six essays to review and expand on the results.

The numerical summary of the 54 final responses to the survey are below:

98% of respondents agree housing subsidized by the state should be restricted to Hawai'i residents (clarification for those who commented: this is not a term used to imply USA citizenship, therefore, includes our Compact of Free Association [COFA] community)

98% of respondents agree housing subsidized by the state should be restricted to people who rent/own only the subsidized home they would live in

90% of respondents agree \$1,500 per month is an affordable payment for mortgage or rent for a two-bedroom housing unit

82% of respondents agree housing subsidized by the state near transit should have limited parking to encourage mass transit use

96% of respondents agree 50,000 homes filled into 1,000 acres of existing urban land is better than 10,000 acres of agricultural or conservation land

Our subsequent write-ups should help answer some questions that are outstanding or that may have come up because of this survey, such as: How does this affect the housing advocacy goals of Faith Action? What are the different kinds of government subsidies for housing? What does it even mean to be a "state resident"? What is the definition of "affordable"? What makes transportation and housing interrelated? How much new housing do we need to build? Where should new housing be built? What is the relationship between housing density and affordability?

The task force will expand on these questions and explain the direction we believe fits the values of the Faith Action membership based on your responses, and more importantly, the direction that best meets the needs of the low-income people we advocate for and are called to serve because of those values.


The task force will be asking the general membership to participate in testimony and advocate for actions based on the opinions provided by this survey. The series of essays you will see from the HousingNOW! Task Force will be important for equipping you with the breadth and depth of knowledge that you can use in your advocacy and testimony.

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
