DEAR PARISH FAMILY,

"Do you also wish to go away?" This is the question Jesus poses in this Sunday's Gospel reading. It is a question that reminds us that at the very center of our following Jesus, there's got to be loyalty. When Jesus asked the disciples for a radical change in their lives, some found it so hard, that they could not take up the challenge and therefore turned and walked away. When we are faced with the difficult teachings of Jesus and the Church, do we also wish to go away? Is it not true that many times, because of the complexity of the issues and the pressures of the society around us, we may wish to "go away?" Peter's response to Jesus' question is striking. He doesn't say, "yes, of course," but he doesn't quite say "no" either. Instead, he answers back with another question: "To whom else shall we go...?" It is an honest answer. Peter and the others stay with Jesus precisely because he has been a source of life for them. Jesus liberated them and gave them new life.

Following Jesus and the teachings of the Church may not always be easy, or pleasant, or even totally comprehensible; but when it comes to the eternal-life business, there's not much out there in the way of alternatives. In a similar way, in this Sunday's second reading from the letter to the community at Ephesus, Paul exhorts a life of loyalty in married life. Loyalty always has to have its basis rooted in love, just like the love of Christ and the Church.

This week let us not forget the words of Jesus: "Whoever eats me will live because of me." Let us give witness to our Catholic faith and to God's plan, that through our stewardship of every gift that the Lord has given us, we may be instruments that are loyal to the Lord as we continue to build his Kingdom here on earth.

Know your Catholic Faith Corner

Apologetics Without Apology

Year of Reading the Bible

Joshua 24: 1-2a, 15-17, 18b; Ephesians 5:21-32; John 6:60-69

Scriptural Background: We now come to the last in a series of readings from the Gospel of John, chapter 6. Next week we resume with the Gospel according to Mark. We return to the setting for these readings from John's gospel, the synagogue at Capernaum. The Passover is near (v. 4) and it is a year before Good Friday. Up to this point, Jesus' listeners have managed to accept several difficult claims by him - that he is the Messiah (verse 14), that if they believe in him he can raise them up to eternal life (verses 44, 47), and even that he is, somehow, bread (verse 51). With his announcement that his "flesh is true food," his "blood is true drink" and "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him" (verse 55-56), many of his disciples reach the limits of their faith: "This saying is hard; who can accept it?" (verse 60) Jesus refuses to soften his message (verses 62-63) and does not, as he had done in the past (Mark 4:34), offer an explanation that could have kept his disciples from leaving (verse 67). He clearly meant what he said, and accepted the fact that some would not believe (verses 64-66). It was not long after this that Judas would decide to betray him (verses 70-71).

Questions for Reflection:

- •What is Jesus' immediate reaction to their defection (verses 61 and 64)? What does his reaction show about him?
- •Read verse 61 "does this shock you?" (Greek: scandalon, a stumbling block) at this?" How are his listeners scandalized by Jesus' words about the Eucharist? Are there some people today scandalized by the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist? How? Why?

Reading 1 Joshua 24:1-2a, 15-17, 18b

Joshua gathered together all the tribes of Israel at Shechem, summoning the elders, leaders, judges, and officers of Israel. When they stood in ranks before God, Joshua addressed all the people: "Thus says the LORD, the God of Israel: In times past your ancestors, down to Terah, father of Abraham and Nahor, lived beyond the River and served other gods.

If it is displeasing to you to serve the LORD, choose today whom you will serve, the gods your ancestors served beyond the River or the gods of the Amorites in whose country you are dwelling. As for me and my household, we will serve the LORD."

But the people answered, "Far be it from us to forsake the LORD to serve other gods.

For it was the LORD, our God, who brought us and our ancestors up out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery. He performed those great signs before our very eyes and protected us along our entire journey and among all the peoples through whom we passed.

Therefore we also will serve the LORD, for he is our God."

Since Jesus knew that his disciples were murmuring about this, he said to them, "Does this shock you?

What if you were to see the Son of Man ascending to where he was before?

It is the spirit that gives life, while the flesh is of no avail. The words I have spoken to you are spirit and life.

But there are some of you who do not believe."

Jesus knew from the beginning the ones who would not believe and the one who would betray him.

And he said, "For this reason I have told you that no one can come to me unless it is granted him by my Father."

As a result of this, many [of] his disciples returned to their former way of life and no longer accompanied him.

Jesus then said to the Twelve, "Do you also want to leave?"

Simon Peter answered him, "Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life.

We have come to believe and are convinced that you are the Holy One of God."

Reading II Ephesians 5:21-32

Brothers and Sisters:

Be subordinate to one another out of reverence for Christ.

Wives should be subordinate to their husbands as to the Lord.

For the husband is head of his wife just as Christ is head of the church, he himself the savior of the body.

As the church is subordinate to Christ, so wives should be subordinate to their husbands in everything. Husbands, love your wives, even as Christ loved the church and handed himself over for her to sanctify her, cleansing her by the bath of water with the word, that he might present to himself the church in splendor, without spot or wrinkle or any such thing, that she might be holy and without blemish.

So [also] husbands should love their wives as their own bodies. He who loves his wife loves himself.

For no one hates his own flesh but rather nourishes and cherishes it, even as Christ does the church, because we are members of his body.

"For this reason a man shall leave [his] father and [his] mother and be joined to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh."



SPOTLIGHT ON SERVICE

Envision yourself seated at St. John Vianney Church. What color are the banners surrounding the altar? Why are they that color? What other decorative touches are visible? Greenery? Floral arrangements? If it is a special time of year, such as Christmas, you'll note the Nativity scene set up near the Tabernacle and dozens of poinsettia plants throughout the church. All of these are aspects of the environmental ministry. For more than three decades, this ministry at St. John Vianney has been coordinated by the volunteer efforts of Bob Badham, who contributes his aesthetic talents so that our church environment can enhance the liturgy without dominating it.

Raised on a farm in Washington State, Bob learned the value of hard work at an early age. He expected that farming would be his future, until he discovered his artistic talents while in college. Part-time employment at a local florist during his college years gave him an opportunity to develop his aesthetic gifts. He went on to earn a Master's degree in Art Education from the University of Oregon, which led to an employment offer from Punahou School. Bob and his wife, Jarleth, accepted the offer and left Oregon for Hawaii, a place they had never been. Talk about a leap of faith!

During Bob's thirty years as a teacher and administrator at Punahou, he and Jarleth raised three sons. One of the major lessons Bob shared with them was, "Use your gifts." And luckily for us, he has demonstrated this belief by sharing his talents here at St. John Vianney. Throughout the year, as the liturgical seasons change, Bob's team transforms the church accordingly. Green for Ordinary time; purple for Lent and Advent; red for Palm Sunday, Good Friday and Pentecost; white and gold for Christmas and Easter. This requires not only aesthetic sensibilities, but also the physical strength to climb ladders and to move plants and other objects around the church. An interest in plants and flowers and an understanding of their care is also important to this work. The beautiful manger scene we see every Christmas was designed by Bob and built with help from fellow parishioner Paul Akeo. Similarly, at Easter, our church décor benefits from his creations.

Bob would be the first person to say that environmental ministry is a team effort. The work gets done only because a group of volunteers are willing to contribute their time and their talent. But this is also why Bob was willing to let this "Spotlight on Service" shine on him. He is grateful for the many individuals, past and present, whose service as environmental ministers has enhanced our sense of place as we worship. But now, he feels, the time has come for others to step forward and contribute their aesthetic gifts to lead this ministry.

As the Faith Action Anniversary planning committee digs out memorabilia of the past 25 years of our existence, some of those sentiments are felt.

We are reverential when we read about the handful of ministers who quietly met and eventually led their congregations to spearhead "Faith Action for Community Equity" long before it had a name.

We feel the *excitement* our founders may have felt when they *engaged* other churches and members of the larger community to join in the work.

We are *inspired* to recognize leaders who were led by the Spirit to work for social justice. Some leaders are no longer with us; some are still here "fighting the good fight."


