150th Anniversary of Father Damien’s Arrival in Kalaupapa on May 10th

The annual Memorial of St. Damien de Veuster is May 10, which is the anniversary of the date of his arrival in Kalaupapa, Molokai. This year marks the 150th anniversary of that momentous event. This feast day is an obligatory memorial in the Diocese of Honolulu and will be celebrated on Wednesday, May 10th at our parish’s 8 a.m. daily Mass. Bishop Larry Silva also invites everyone to an evening Memorial Mass at the Cathedral Basilica of Our Lady of Peace which holds a first class relic of the saint.

The Diocese of Honolulu announces the ordination of Kurt Keali’i Meyer and Hai Thanh Pham to the Order of Transitional Deacon on Saturday, May 20th. CATHOLIC FAITH CORNER



A YEAR OF THE EUCHARISTIC REVIVAL —Manna From Heaven

What is the background of this manna from heaven? It is about the reliance on God by means of a physical reality of food provided.

When Moses led the Israelites to freedom, they often yearned to return to Egypt. Though they were miraculously provided for throughout their forty years of wandering in the desert, they were often nostalgic for the “good old (bad) days” in Egypt: *“We remember the fish we ate free in Mitzrayim; also, the cucumber, melons, onions and garlic”* (Numbers 11:5). Somehow, the miracle of the manna that fell from heaven each day in the wilderness did not satisfy the Israelites’ hunger for security. Though in actuality they were oppressed and enslaved by the Egyptians, the Israelites looked back on their time in Egypt with nostalgia because they could not bear the uncertainty they faced as a free people.

Freedom is, ultimately, uncertain and unpredictable. One of the first lessons we all must learn in order to be free, is how to “bear” uncertainty and trust in the unknown. The manna was a vehicle for learning this lesson. Each day for forty years, the Israelites would have to go out and gather their daily supply of manna, just enough for that day. The manna provided the necessary preparation for becoming a free people, for freedom requires an ability to bear uncertainty, to *not* know what is going to happen next, and to trust in the unfolding journey.

The manna challenged the Israelites to develop a beginner’s mind, to experience something new and fresh, while eating the very same thing each day. Instead of seeking the answers that might put their questions to rest, the manna taught the Israelites to continually live the questions, to understand that the journey to freedom is about remaining awake and curious, and not going into sleep mode.

**Manna from Heaven.
Jesus is the Bread of Life**

*"I am the bread of life.
Your fathers ate the manna in the wilderness, and are dead.
This is the bread which comes down from heaven,
that one may eat of it and not die."
(John 6:58)*

A year long focus to further educate our parish community and the Kailua community about the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist



1. God called the manna “bread.” (**Exodus 16:12**)
Jesus called Himself the “bread of life” and the “living bread.” (**John 6:48, 51**)
2. Manna provided the Israelites with temporal life.
Jesus the living bread provides all with eternal life: “I am the living bread . . . if any man eat of this bread, he shall live for ever.” (**John 6:51**)
3. Manna came from heaven: The lord told Moses, “I will rain bread from heaven.” (**Exodus 16:4**)
Jesus is “the bread which cometh down from heaven.” (**John 6:50**)
4. The lord God gave manna to the children of Israel.
God “gave his only begotten Son” (**John 3:16**) to the children of men.
5. There was enough manna for every person. (**Exodus 16:16–18**)
The Atonement of Jesus Christ is infinite, sufficient to cover all of God’s children.
6. Every person received his fill of manna: “They gathered every man according to his eating.” (**Exodus 16:18**)
Jesus fills those who are spiritually hungry: “I am the bread of life; he that cometh to me shall never hunger.” (**John 6:35**)
7. Manna was undeserved. The lord said, “I have heard the murmurings of the children of Israel, . . . at even ye shall eat flesh, and in the morning ye shall be filled with bread.” (**Exodus 16:12**)
Jesus died for undeserving sinners: “For when we were yet without strength, in due time Christ died for the ungodly. . . . While we were yet sinners, Christ died for us.” (**Romans 5:6, 8**)
8. The children of Israel ate manna for 40 years (**Exodus 16:35**), a period of testing.
Jesus was tempted of Satan after fasting forty days and forty nights. (**Matthew 4:1–2**)
9. Concerning those who overcome the world, they will be given “to eat of the hidden Manna.” (**Revelations 2:17**)
Jesus, the “living bread,” is “hidden,” or unknown, to the wicked but revealed to the righteous.

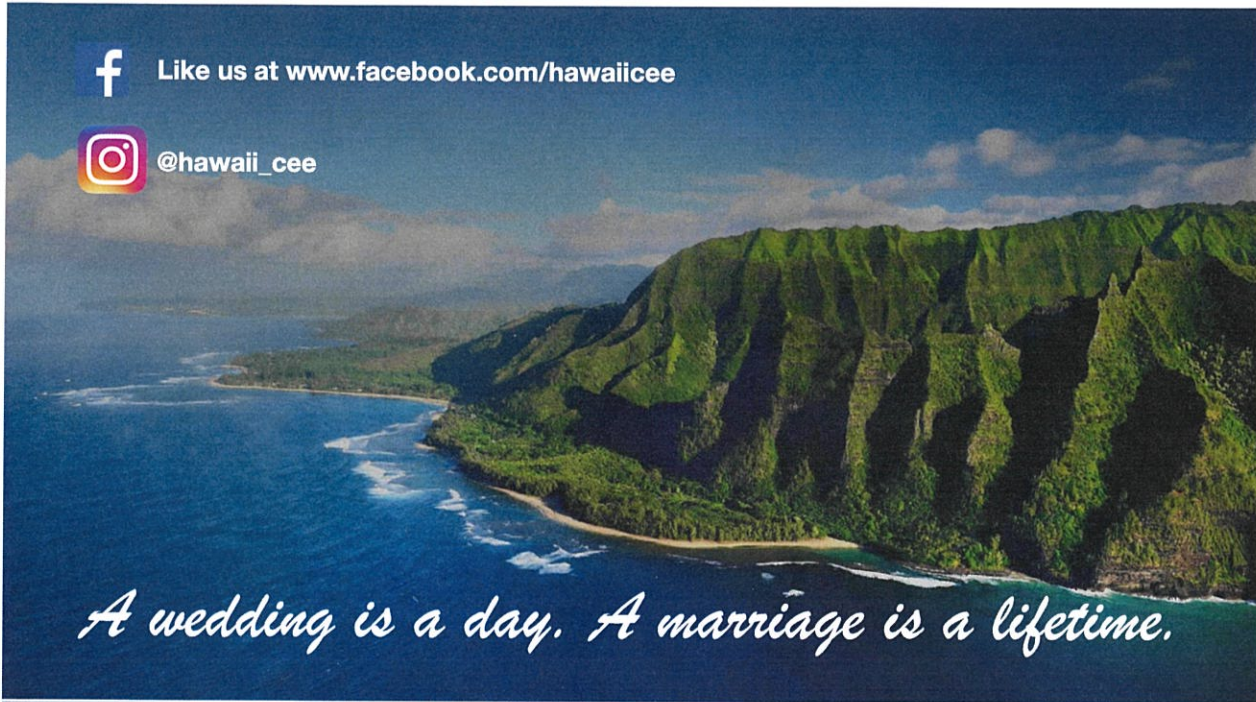

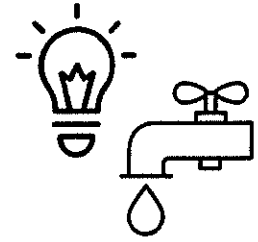

LOW-INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM & LOW-INCOME HOME WATER ASSISTANCE PROGRAM



STRUGGLING WITH HOME ENERGY OR WATER BILLS?

LIHEAP

The Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) helps keep the power on with Energy Credit toward future payments and Energy Crisis Intervention for households that have been or are facing disconnection due to past-due payments.

LIHWAP

The Low-Income Home Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP) helps with water and wastewater bills through Water Crisis Intervention for households that have been or are facing disconnection due to past-due payments.

PLEASE INCLUDE ALL OF THE FOLLOWING DOCUMENTS WHEN SUBMITTING YOUR APPLICATION:

- **CURRENT UTILITY BILL:** Must be the entire bill showing usage at current resident address. If applying for gas assistance, also submit your most recent electric bill. If applying for ECI or WCI, you must also submit your Disconnection Notice.
- **PROOF OF RESIDENCE:** Provide a document other than the utility bill that shows current address for the applicant. (Example: phone bill, cable bill, etc.)
- **PHOTO IDENTIFICATION:** Provide photo ID for all household members 18 years & older.
- **SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBERS:** Provide legal documents to verify Social Security Numbers of all household members over 1 year old.
- **PROOF OF INCOME:** Provide proof of income for all household members. Provide all that apply: Last pay stubs for all jobs since January 2023; Self Employed Log/Receipts showing income/expenses for 2023; 2023 Award letters for Social Security, SSI; Pension/ Retirement, Log of Unemployment benefits received in 2023, etc.
- **PROOF OF NON-CITIZEN STATUS:** If you are a non-citizen, please provide your Permanent Resident Alien Card (Green Card).
- **COMPLETED LIHEAP APPLICATION:** Please ensure the application is completely filled out. Do not leave any questions blank. Use N/A or None where necessary, or zero if no one in your household receives that type of income.
- **SIGNATURE:** All adults over 18 in the household must sign the application.
- **L-3 Consent to Release (Enclosed):** Complete and sign the top portion. If your utility account is in another person's name, they must complete and sign the bottom portion of the form and provide a copy of their ID.
